Under the care and connect model, each school prioritizes Social and Emotional Learning opportunities. A school counselor is dedicated to each school to support students and staff. School counselors meet with students by appointment, in groups and on a walk-in basis. The school gives students a choice of activities prior to starting school, supporting the start of their day. Once the school day starts, students enter the classroom and start the day with a classroom meeting. During the week, each classroom has two lessons per week from the school counselor. All students have access to the Super Hero Academy, a place to practice self-regulation along with their school wide tools. A district nurse is available to speak with families by phone or meet with students in person to discuss wellness and mental and physical health. A school based health center is located in the district at the NKN MS/HS campus.

In general, decisions of school health and safety reside with school and district officials. Together with local public health officials, school/district administrators should consult a variety of individuals when making decisions about health and safety in school.

Describe how you will ensure continuity of instruction for students who may miss school due to illness.	Attendance secretaries notify administration, nurse, and counselors when student illness affects attendance. Plans are agreed upon and made with student and families to ensure student stays connected to classes and teachers when missing instructional time.
Describe how you identify those in your school setting that are disproportionately impacted by communicable disease and which students and families may need differentiated or additional support.	District nurse and principals work closely with Special Education Director, School Counselors and English Language Learner Specialist to identify individuals or groups disproportionately impacted, connecting students and families to appropriate support teams.

Specific accommodations would be implemented utilizing wrap around services including family resource coordinator, translator or other district or community supports. Individual student plans would be developed as needed including alternative educational options due to complications related to complications related to a communicable disease.

Each school has scheduled staff meetings and collaboration days where this information is reviewed, discussed and implemented. Smaller impromptu team meetings can be scheduled and coordinated as needed to implement student specific strategies.



Section 3. Communicable Disease Outbreak Prevention and Response:

Implementing mitigation activities, responding to periods of increased transmission, resuming baseline level mitigation, and debriefing actions to improve the process

Planning for and implementing proactive health and safety mitigation measures assists schools in reducing communicable disease transmission within the school environment for students, staff, and community members. Communicable disease, including norovirus, flu and COVID-19, will continue to circulate in our communities and our schools. Schools will utilize different mitigation measures based on local data, and observation of what is happening in their schools (e.g., transmission within their facilities and communities.) In the following section, teams will document their school’s approach to the CDC, OHA and ODE advised health and safety measures at baseline, during increased transmission.

Table 5. Communicable Disease Mitigation Measures

OHA/ODE Recommendation(s) Layered Health and Safety Measures	Describe what mitigating measures the school will implement to reduce and respond to the spread of communicable disease and protect in-person instruction?
Immunizations	The school based health center located at the MS/HS campus offers vaccines weekly. At the start of the school year, booster and vaccine clinics will be encouraged and communicated with the staff and community. Information for families and students are communicated through school newsletters. The county public health also shares vaccine clinic information to the schools, which then inform families.
Face Coverings	Face coverings are optional.
Isolation	Students and staff are isolated as per OHA guidelines for school settings. Secretary and attendance staff communicate current isolation guidelines to students and staff. District nurse provides updated guidelines and training to staff and administrators. District nurse calls families regarding questions or concerns as needed or directed.
Symptom Screening	Students and staff screen at home with “stay home when sick” consistent messaging. Students or staff with symptoms can present to health rooms at each location for screening by secretary or school nurse. Students may be referred to health room by school staff as needed for any health concern.
COVID-19 Diagnostic Testing	Take home COVID tests can be provided to ill students to use at home, upon request and based on availability.
Airflow and Circulation	Air purifiers will be used in health rooms and available for classrooms as well. Windows can be opened as needed to increase airflow.
Cohorting	No cohorts are recommended to begin the 2023-24 school year.

OHA/ODE Recommendation(s) Layered Health and Safety Measures	Describe what mitigating measures the school will implement to reduce and respond to the spread of communicable disease and protect in-person instruction?
Physical Distancing	No physical distancing is recommended to begin the 2023-23 school year.
Hand Washing	Hand washing encouraged at multiple points during the school day with a primary focus prior to eating. Hand sanitizer is available and stocked at several high traffic areas.
Cleaning and Disinfection	High touch surface areas cleaned multiple times per day, per a cleaning schedule.
Training and Public Health Education	Letters will be sent home to describe exclusion requirements, health protocols and communicable disease specific information at the beginning of the school year and throughout the school year via emails and newsletters. District nurse attends monthly board meetings, providing health updates to board members, administrators and community members. District nurse attends regularly scheduled staff meetings to answer questions and provide guidance.

PRACTICING PLAN TO BE READY

Training exercises are essential to preparedness ensuring individuals understand their role in a communicable disease event. Exercises can also help identify gaps in the planning, thereby building upon and strengthening the plan over time. Schools, districts, and ESDs should schedule to exercise this plan annually and when any revisions are made to update the plan. The plan, or component(s) of the plan, can be tested through conversations, practice exercises, or other activities.
